## Library to Celebrate Anniversary

It seems hard to believe, but the Dexter District Library building on Alpine Street turns 10 years old in 2019. We will be celebrating this milestone on **Sunday, May 5 from 2:00 to 4:00 pm** with an open house for the community. We will have refreshments and music from a small group of Dexter Chamber Orchestra members. The Library staff is working on a number of displays to highlight the changes and accomplishments we have experienced in the last decade. The best news is, the Library remains a hub of community activity, greeting approximately 175,000 visitors each year.

We opened the new facility on March 9, 2009 after three years of planning, land acquisition and construction.



Opening the new building marked a tremendous leap in the evolution of the Library. Additional space for the collections has allowed for more convenient browsing and resulted in checking out twice as many items as was the case in the previous building. The increase in study space, small and large group meeting rooms and

cozy reading areas has doubled the number of our annual visitors and our large meeting room has helped draw record crowds that could have never been previously accommodated. ## Book Delivery Service for Shut-Ins

A number of years ago, the Library attempted to create a program to bring books and other Library materials to area residents who are confined to home. The first attempt did not make it off the ground. Through the Friends of the Library, we found we had many more volunteers wanting to deliver items than we had residents in need of the service.

The Friends of the Library have kept this area of volunteer service listed on their application and have a number of people interested in providing delivery service.

The Library is reaching out through the newsletter to see if there is a need for this service in the community. If you or someone you know would like to access Library services, but is unable to leave home, please

Over the spring, we will be collecting names of interested, homebound individuals. If there is significant demand, we will institute procedures that will allow Library staff to manage accounts for the homebound and recruit delivery carriers from the Friends of the Library.

Please note that this service is envisioned to help the elderly, those with disabilities and others who are temporarily or permanently confined to home. Unfortunately, the Library does not have the resources or sufficient volunteers to offer this as a convenience delivery service.

# Spring Children's Programs

## Story Times

Spring Story Times for toddlers and preschoolers began on Monday, March 25 and will run until Thursday, May 16. Registration is required, parents or caregivers of children may register in person at the Library or by calling 734-426-4477. Space is limited so registration will be on a first come first served basis.

Children 18 months to 3 years of age may sign up for one Toddler Story Time. Toddler Story Times are held on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays at 10:30 am. Children under 18 months may attend, however books and activities are geared for toddlers. Children 3 to 5 years of age may sign up for one Preschool Story Time. Preschool Story Times are held on Mondays or Tuesdays at 11:30 am. Combined Toddler/Preschool Story Times will be offered on Wednesdays at 11:30 am. Drop-In Family Story Times for all ages will be offered on Thursdays at 10:30 am in the lower level meeting room from March 28 to May 16. Infants are welcome at story times with their siblings. Parents or caregivers are required to attend. Each session lasts approximately 30 minutes.

## First Tuesday Lego Club

**Saturday, May 11 at 10:00 am** finds the return of **KinderConcert!**



Members of the A<sup>2</sup>SO join movement specialist Gari Stein and pianist Kathryn Goodson for a guided introduction to the instruments of the orchestra. Registration is not required.

This activity will meet on **Thursday, April 25 from 4:00 to 5:00 pm** and again **Thursday, May 30 from 4:00 to 5:00 pm**.

The Library will also offer a special **Preschool Makerspace** on **Saturday, April 27 from 11:00 am to 12:00 pm**. Children ages five and under, along with their caregivers, are invited to make, create and play at the Library. Children will explore a variety of stations with open-ended activities designed to encourage early learning. Registration is not required. Caregivers must stay with their children.

The Club meets on the first Saturday of each month with instructors from the Hudson Education Center on hand to teach attendees new songs. Each meeting begins with tuning and a warm-up. New chords are introduced and techniques practiced at each meeting.

## Seed Library Returns on April 1

The Library's Seed Library will once again be available beginning **Monday, April 1, 2019** when our doors open.

The Seed Library provides organic, heirloom, non-hybrid seeds for Library cardholders to check out, plant and grow over the summer.

The goal of the Seed Library is to create an ongoing resource for residents interested in gardening to try new varieties of flowers and vegetables or discover the joys of gardening from scratch.


This year marks the third year in our trial project. The Library has received numerous comments from patrons who enjoy having this resource available in the spring. Unfortunately, follow

through with saving and returning seeds has been minimal. The key to sustaining a seed lending library is for those who check out the seeds in the spring to harvest and save seeds to return to the Library in the fall.

The Library staff will be changing the checkout process this year. Seeds may be retrieved from the Adult Reference Desk, but packets will not be on open display. We will be collecting additional contact information from borrowers to help engage gardeners throughout the summer with additional contact via e-mail, our Facebook page and sharing of the successes and challenges of growing flowers and vegetables from seed.



Each Summer, the Library plants representative seeds from the collection to promote the availability of the Seed Library. The raised planters were funded through a 2017 grant from the Chelsea Garden Club.

The Friends of the Library have been busy over the winter. A sculpture honoring former Library Board President and Friends Book Sale Coordinator, Martha Davis, has been ordered and will arrive in March.

The monthly Book Sales continue to be well attended. Income continues to be on par with previous year sales. Donations also continue to be good, but we can always use more. Friends members continue to volunteer many hours to both sort and work at these sales.

On May 5, the Dexter District Library

will host an open house, marking the 10-year anniversary of the Alpine Street building. It is worth noting some of the achievements of the Friends of the Library over this period.

The Friends were major contributors during the construction project, donating over \$10,000 to help furnish the Quiet Reading Room on the second floor and ensure the fireplace was included in the construction. The Friends also contributed \$10,000 to help the Library create the terrace area facing Mill Creek Park.

On an ongoing basis, the Friends group is the leading donor in support of the Summer Reading Program, contributing \$3,000 each year to help offset the cost of events and prizes. The Library's movie showings are sponsored by the Friends with an annual contribution of \$1,700. Sponsorship of the Consumer's Reports online service is another \$1,100 annual contribution to the Library. On a trial basis, the Friends also have supported the Library's RBDigital, downloadable mag-

azine service with a donation of \$5,200. Each year, the Friends contribute \$500 for additional children's programming supplies and cover the cost of replacing the American and Michigan flags.

Two of our Friends members, Dan Chapman and Michael Raatz have tirelessly taken children's books, that have not sold after multiple Book Sales, to Mitchell School in Ann Arbor. Mitchell has the highest rate of underprivileged children in the area. Dan and Michael will soon retire from this project, but this work will continue.




On **Tuesday, April 2 at 6:00 pm**, the Library will present **Korea, Land of the Morning Calm**. Join Mariya Fogarasi, who spent four years on an American Army base in Seoul, to get an insider view of South Korea. From its time as a Japanese colony through the Korean War to the present, Fogarasi will share her experiences as she passed between different worlds and cultures.

Learn about the **10 Warning Signs of Alzheimer's** on **Wednesday, April 10 at 6:00 pm**. Learn the differences between age-related memory loss and Alzheimer's disease and what to do if someone you know has signs of Alzheimer's. View footage of people living in the early stages of Alzheimer's and hear the experiences of these individuals and their families. Diane Wyse and Jim Mangi from the Michigan Great Lakes Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association will present and answer questions.

By the 1830s, Michigan applied to the U.S. Congress to become a state, with a southern border that included Toledo. The rivalry between the Wolverines and the Buckeyes pales in comparison to the events of 1835. Presented by Joseph Oldenburg, author, historian and former Assistant Director at the Detroit Public Library.



**Medicare Made Easy** comes to the Library on **Wednesday, May 8 at 6:30 pm**. Medicare can be confusing. It is easy to miss important information and make a wrong choice that can cost you thousands of dollars down the road. Learn how to avoid paying

for coverage that isn't needed. The issues of Medigap, Medicare Advantage, enrollment periods, pre-existing conditions, Part D drug plans, and what questions to ask before signing up for an insurance plan will also be covered. The seminar is presented by Ashley Erickson and Debbie Holmes, Medicare Plan Specialists with Michigan Farm Bureau. This is strictly an educational program. No products will be sold.

Join us at the Library for **Berlin: History and Highlights of a Fascinating City** on **Tuesday, May 21 at 6:00 pm** when Mariya Fogarasi returns to share her experiences in Berlin. Germany's largest metropolis, Berlin first became the capital in 1871 when the German states unified to become the German Empire, but after defeat in World War II, Berlin became an "outpost" during the Cold War years. Following German reunification in 1990, the German parliament voted to move its capital city from Bonn back to reunited Berlin, which has now resurfaced bigger, better and culturally stronger than ever before. Fogarasi spent 10 years in Berlin and will explore Berlin's history and must-see sights with her lively power point presentation.

**Detroit: an Illustrated Timeline** comes to the Library on **Thursday, May 23 at 6:30 pm**. At the dawn of the eighteenth century Detroit was established as simply an outpost for the French to take advantage of the fur trade while keeping the British at bay. For over 300 years, this small

**iPhone, iPad, and Apple Watch - Tuesday, April 16 at 6:00 pm and Thursday, April 18 at 9:00 am**. In this class, you will be shown how to organize apps, bookmark websites, close non-responsive apps, and various other beginner's topics. We will also discuss the new Apple Watch Series 4's apps and features. Please bring your own device so that you may practice on it.

**Getting the Most Out of Your Smart Phone - Tuesday, April 23 at 6:00 pm and Thursday, April 25 at 9:00 am**. Learn advanced topics like backing up your photos/videos, subscribing to podcasts, and using your app store to the

fullest. Library apps, how to buy apps without using a credit card, and some of our favorite apps are topics of discussion.

**Microsoft Excel 2019 - Part 1 - Tuesday, May 7 at 6:00 pm and Thursday, May 9 at 9:00 am**. In this class, you will learn how to create workbook files using Excel 2019. The Library also offers **One-on-One Technology Help**. Individualized half-hour sessions will be offered on Tuesday, March 26 between 1:00 to 3:00 pm and 6:00 to 8:00 pm, Tuesday, April 30 between 1:00 to 3:00 pm and 6:00 to 8:00 pm, Tuesday, May 28 between 1:00 to 3:00 pm and 6:00 to 8:00 pm.

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## Director's Corner by Paul McCann



Our spring at the Library is full of preparations for our upcoming Summer Reading Program. In addition to planning the events, securing prizes and developing the reading schedule, our staff will visit all the classrooms at Anchor, Beacon, Wylie and Creekside schools to build enthusiasm for the program. We hope this year's participation continues on an upward trend that saw over 1,400 children register for summer reading.

The Library is in the planning stages to provide Wi-Fi hot spots as a non-traditional item for borrowing. Over the course of the spring, we will finalize equipment agreements with AT&T, Sprint, T-Mobile and Verizon, develop the borrowing policies and catalog these items so they may be borrowed. Please look for detailed information in the next newsletter.

For those of you who use our Download Destination service, the company is once again offering the Big Library Read. This event provides unlimited access to a single title. This year's title is *Homes: A Refugee Story* by Abu Bakr al Rabeeah and Winnie Yeung. The title will be available for unlimited download between April 1 through April 15. If you are not a current user of Download Destination, stop by the Adult Reference Desk for information on how to begin accessing this service.



Poor reading skills continue to be one of the major impediments to getting and keeping a good job or obtaining stable living situations. Did you know that one adult out of every eight in Washtenaw County lacks the basic skills to read, write or communicate in English? In an effort to combat this problem, the Dexter District Library is hosting representatives from Washtenaw Literacy who will discuss **"The ABCs of Washtenaw Literacy: Volunteer Recruitment and Orientation"** on **Thursday, April 4 at 6:30 pm** in the Dexter District Library meeting room. This program will give those who are interested in volunteering to teach adults how to read an opportunity to meet representatives from Washtenaw Literacy, find out about tutoring opportunities and learn about the tutor training provided by Washtenaw Literacy.
