
#### **Neighbors Read**

Chelsea and Dexter District Libraries have a

long history of community reading programs and for good reason. Even as a solitary act, reading has been shown to build empathy. When we read as a community, we can spread that empathy to our family, friends, and neighbors.

For over a decade, both libraries have hosted community reading programs;

first, through the 5 Healthy Towns Community Read and then through the now disbanded Washtenaw Reads, the countywide reading program. This year, the Chelsea District Library, the Dexter District




Library, and Serendipity Books decided to keep

The Super Stories Book Club for Young Fives and Kindergarteners is a story and craft program for kids transitioning out of story times and into book clubs. This 45minute program will meet on Tuesdays, December 10, January 14, February 11 and March 11 with all meetings held at 4:30 pm. Adults should attend this program with their children. 


