Library Retires Construction Bond

On May 1, 2025, the Dexter District Library officially retired the construction bond, which provided the funds to build the building on Alpine Street. The bond, which was approved by the community at the November 2005 election, provided the Library with \$7.8 million dollars to purchase three properties on Alpine, clear the houses on the properties and construct the new Library.

The original bond carried interest rates between 3.5% to 4.1% In late 2014, the Library was able to call the outstanding bonds and refinance the package at rates between 2.0% to 3.0% for the final 10 years, saving over \$340,000 in future interest costs.

Through growth and development throughout the Library's service area, the annual debt retirement millage was reduced from the initial tax levy of 0.53 mills to 0.34 mills in the final full year.

After the final payment, there is less than \$10,000 in the debt retirement account. The excess funds will be transferred to the general operations account.

There will be no debt service levy from the Library on the December 2025 tax bills.

The Library would like to thank all community members, past and present, for their support of the Library and their faith in passing such a generous bond.

Drop-In Summer Story Times at the Library resume on Monday and Thursday mornings at 11 am. The summer session of Story Time will run June 23 through July 31. We will be meeting in the Lower Level Meeting Room.

The Story Time themes presented on Mondays will be

Recurring Favorites



Our Lego Club is designed for a wide age range, inviting students in grades K through 8 to drop in and build with Legos provided by the Library. Lego Club will meet on Tuesdays July 1 and July 29 from 4:30 pm to 5:30 pm.

The Super Stories Book Club For Young Fives and Kindergarteners returns this summer. This 45-minute program is for kids transitioning out of story time and into book clubs. Adults should attend this program with their children. Each month, Miss Ruth will read books related to a theme and then the kids will do a theme related craft or activity. The group will meet on **Tuesdays**, **June 24** (Theme: Color) and **July 22** (Theme: Summer), with both programs starting at **2 pm**. Registration is required and opens the day of the previous meeting.

The **Club Create Book Club** is an independent book club for first and second graders. Each month, Ms. Krista will read longer picture books centered on a theme and the group will participate in activities and crafts related to the theme. Club Create meets **Thursday**, July 10 at 2 pm (Theme: Oceans). Registration is required and opens on June 5.

Movies at the Library




Come in and cool off during a hot summer with Movies at the Library.

On **Friday, June 20 at 1 pm**, join us for a screening of **Wicked**, starring Ariana Grande, Cynthia Erivo and Jeff Goldblum in the movie version of the successful musical. Rated PG, 2 hours 40 minutes.



Eadweard will be shown on Friday, July 11, at 6 pm. Starring: Michael Eklund, Sara Canning and Christopher Heyerdahl, this psychological drama about the turn-of-the-century photographer Eadweard Muybridge, who was the first to photograph subjects in movement and became the godfather of cinema, traces his pioneering movement studies while attempting to keep his marriage intact. This film is not rated and runs 1 hour 44 minutes.



Friday, July 18 at 1 pm finds The Brutalist, starring Adrien Brody, Felicity Jones and Guy Pearce coming to the Library. Escaping postwar Europe, a visionary architect comes to America to rebuild his life, his career, and his marriage. Rated R, 3 hour 35 minutes. Bob Trevino Likes It will be shown on Friday, Au-

gust 15 at 1 pm. Starring Barbie Ferreira, John Leguizamo and French Stewart, a lonely 20something accidentally befriends a stranger online who shares the exact same name as her own self-centered father. Encouragement and support from this new Bob Trevino could change her life for the better. Inspired by a true story. Rated PG-13, 1 hour 42 minutes. On Monday, July 7 at 7 pm, the Library presents the virtual program Dancing in the Dark: A History of Dance in the Movies. The movies and dancing are a partnership born in heaven. From its very beginnings, the new medium of motion pictures turned toward dance as one of the best ways to showcase its unique ability to make movement come alive. Shibori is a resist technique that might look similar to tie-dye but it has been around since the 6th century. In this workshop, you will learn how to make a shibori design and natural dye bath using marigold flowers and create a gorgeous gold-

This program will be led by Kristan Green, who considers herself an experimental natural dyer and enjoys seeing what mystery and abundance plants hold. The Glass Academy is a family-owned, community-oriented glass art experience destination. Established to educate the global public about the wonders of glass, share lifelong memories through creativity and exploration, and with the goal

of producing the highest quality Americancrafted glass prod-



ucts, the presenters will discuss the history of glass, why they do what they do and bring tools, color and other items to pass around and discuss. This is a two-hour program with plenty of time for questions with founders Chris Nordin and Michelle Plucinsky.

Author Tim Mulhering visits the Library on Tuesday. August 19 at 7 pm to discuss his work This Magnetic North: Candid Conversations on a Changing Northern Michigan. Mulhering addresses the impact of the pandemic, climate change, and tourism on northern Michigan in this microcosmic look at the phenomenon that's occurring in communities throughout the Great Lakes region and other high-demand, scenic areas in the United States. The author spent more than a year researching and interviewing experts in tourism, agriculture, law enforcement, marine science, nature conservation, government, Native communities, retail and real estate. All weighed in on the profound changes that have come to Northern Michigan.
