Story Times Set to Resume

Fall Story Times will resume the week of **September 22**.

Several Drop-In Story Times will be held each week. On Monday and Thursday mornings at 11 am, the Library will offer combined sessions for children five-years-old and younger. Drop-In Toddler Story Time will be offered on Tuesdays at 10 am for children 18 months old

children 18 months-old to three-years-old and Drop-In Preschool Story Time for children three to five years-old will be held on Tuesdays at 11 **am.** No registration is required for Drop-In Story Times and these sessions take place in the Lower Level Meeting Room.

The Library will also offer **Small Group Story Times**. Registration is required for these sessions and opens on September 10. Toddler Small Group Story Time

will be held on Wednesdays at 10 am and Preschool Small Group Story Time will be held on Wednesdays at 11 am. Small Group Story Times meet in the First Floor Youth Program Room.



Hoopla Changes

With the start of the Library's next fiscal year on October 1, the Library will be implementing a change to the hoopla downloadable content service. The Library will be reducing the number of monthly borrows per card from the current level of 15 items per month to a maximum of eight items borrowed per month. This is in response to the rapidly escalating costs for this service.

The hoopla service provides a catalog of always available items with no request lists or waiting. The convenience is offset by varying costs charged to the Library on a per borrow basis. Costs to borrow any individual item can range from 99¢ to \$5.99 per item. The Library currently

averages approximately \$2.35 per item and hoopla charges full price for each individual use. With print books, the cost per use could be as low as 30¢ per borrow over time.

The limit on borrows was increased during the early stages of the pandemic. This brought in many new users to access digital content, but has also caused hoopla costs to more than double since 2020. Savings achieved through this change will be shifted to purchasing additional content for the Libby / Download Destination service to help reduce wait times. Download Destination works on a more traditional library lending model with hold queues, but also sees twice as much use as hoopla.

Youth and Family Fun



KinderConcert! returns to the Library on **Saturday**, **September 13** at **12 noon**.

Children ages five and younger and their caregivers will find that music comes alive during this 30minute concert. Don't worry about wiggly tots sitting still for a concert -

they will be encouraged to dance and move while listening to the music, hearing a story being told with musical accompaniment and learning about a special orchestral instrument. This program will feature the 'Spectacular Saxophone' with special performer Noah Stoker. Members of the A²SO lead children on a guided introduction to the instruments of the orchestra. This is a drop-in program and no registration is necessary.

Drop-in Fall Crafts comes to the Library on Saturday, September 27 at 11 am. Children of all ages are invited to this drop-in program where they can celebrate the autumn season by making a variety of seasonal crafts, including a fall leaf wind chime. Registration is not required.

Recurring Favorites











Our Lego Club is designed for a wide age range, inviting students in grades K through 8 to drop in and build with Legos provided by the Library. Lego Club will meet on Tuesdays, September 30, November 4 and December 2 from 4:30 to 5:30 pm each day.

The Super Stories Book Club For Young Fives and Kindergarteners returns this fall. This 45-minute program is for kids transitioning out of story time and into book clubs. Adults should attend this program with their children. Each month, Miss Ruth will read books related to a theme and then the kids will do a theme related craft or activity. The group will meet on Tuesdays, October 7 (Theme: Nocturnal Animals), November 11 (Theme: Fall), and December 9 (Theme: Food) with all programs starting at 4:30 pm. Registration is required and opens the day of the previous meeting.

The Club Create Book Club is an independent book club for first and second graders. Each month, Ms. Krista will read longer picture books centered on a theme and the group will participate in activities and crafts related to the theme. Club Create meets Thursdays, October 9 (Theme: Monsters) and November 13 (Theme: Food) at 4:30 pm each day. Registration is required and is now open for the October meeting.

Intro to Ancestry.com will be offered on Tuesday, September 16 at 9 am and again on Thursday, September 18 at 6 pm. Learn to use the Library's Ancestry.com service. Topics for beginners will include creating a family tree, building timelines, and tips for searching on Ancestry.com.

Learn to use a variety of **Downloadable Library Content** on **Tuesday, October 7 at 9 am** or on **Thursday, October 9 at 6 pm**. Explore our Download Destination (OverDrive), hoopla, and Kanopy services through guided tutorials. Bring your own devices and get help setting them up so you can start downloading books, magazines, movies, and more. We'll also show you how to set up the RLA feature within the Libby app, which unlocks over 387,000 additional items.

Interested in manipulating graphics? Join us for Paint.net on Tuesday, November 4 at 9 am and again on Thursday, November 6 at 6 pm. Paint.NET is a powerful, free and easy to use alternative to Photoshop. Learn how to crop, layer, create transparencies and color correct images. Sample photos will be provided.

Get hands-on practice using the Library's equipment to digitize various media formats, including VHS tapes, slides, negatives, audio cassettes, 8mm/Super8 film reels and print photos. Events for Adults This Fall

Over 100,000 film lovers in over 250 cities across six continents gather in cinemas, museums, libraries and universities to view and vote on the finalists for the 28th annual festival. Each date will show all films in this year's running.

Festival attendees are given a voting card and an official program. Attendees will view 10 short films and vote for the one film and actor they feel should win. Votes are tallied by each host venue and emailed to the Festival's headquarters. Winning films will be eligible for Oscar nominations. Last year four films were shortlisted and two were nominated for Oscars, including the winner for best live action "I'm Not a Robot."

Rated PG-13, 1 hour 38 minutes.

On Friday, November 14 at 6 pm we'll show White Bird (2024), starring: Helen Mirren, Ariella Glaser and Gillian Anderson. Julian has struggled to belong ever since he was expelled from his former school. To transform his life, Julian's grandmother finally reveals her own story of courage during her youth in Nazioccupied France. Rated: PG-13, 2 hours.

Friday, November 21 at 1 pm finds Scrambled (2023), starring Leah McKendrick and Andrew Santino, being shown. Quintessential eternal bridesmaid Nellie Robinson (Leah McKendrick) constantly finds herself between weddings, baby showers, and bad dates, when she begins to feel like the clock is ticking and is faced with bleak romantic prospects. Rated R, 1 hour 40 minutes.
