### Story Times Set to Resume

The Library's popular Story Times will resume this January. Drop-In Story Times will begin on January 12 with mixed-age programs Monday and Thursday mornings at 11 am, a Toddler program on Tuesday mornings at 10 am and a Preschool aged program on Tuesday mornings at 11 am. Stories will be geared to the different age groups. Mixed-ages Story Time is geared for children ages 5 and younger. Toddler Story Time is targeted to children 18 months to three years of age and Preschool Story Time is for children three to five years old. These programs will run

through February 26 and take place in the Lower Level Meeting Room. No registration is required.

Small Group Story Times return starting January 14. The Library will offer Toddler Small Group Story Time on Wednesday mornings at 10 am and Preschool Small Group Story Time on Wednesday mornings at 11 am and run through February 25. Registration is required for these programs. Parents or caregivers of children may register on our website

through our calendar of events or by calling 734-426-4477. Registration is currently open. Children may only be registered for one 7-week session.

### Neighbors Read

The Dexter District Library, Chelsea District Library, and Serendipity Books are proud to present the second annual **Neighbors Read**. This community read will bring together readers from the cities of Dexter, Chelsea and the surrounding areas. We focus specifically on books set in our beautiful state, Michigan, or books by Michigan authors. This year's read is *Dead Moose on Isle Royale* by Jeffrey M. Holden.

Isle Royale is one of the most remote and pristine of all the U.S. national parks, and the site of the world's longest-running predator-prey study. Every summer, Holden leads groups of citizen scientists on week-long expeditions to search for dead moose. Those intrepid enough to join him backpacking off trail in Isle Royale's rugged beauty face many challenges as backpacks grow heavier with bones every time a new dead moose is found. Our **Lego Club** is designed for a wide age range, inviting students in grades K-8 to drop in and build with Legos provided by the Library. Lego Club will meet on **Mondays**, **January 5**, **February 2 and March 2 from 4:30 to 5:30 pm** each day.

The Super Stories Book Club For Young Fives and Kindergarteners returns this winter. This 45-minute program is for kids transitioning out of story time and into book clubs. Adults should attend this program with their children. Each month, Miss Ruth will read books related to a theme and then the kids will do a theme related craft or activity. The group will meet on Tuesdays, January 13 (Theme: Winter), February 10 (Theme: Friendship), and March 10 (Theme: Bugs) with all programs starting at 4:30 pm. Registration is required and is open for the January meeting.

The Club Create Book Club is an independent book club for first and second graders. Each month, Ms. Krista will read longer picture books centered on a theme and the group will participate in activities and crafts related to the theme. Club Create meets Thursdays, January 8 (Theme: Winter), February 12 (Theme: Friendship) and March 12 (Theme: Inventions) at 4:30 pm each day. Registration is required and is now open for the January meeting.

The next step up for reading groups is our All Star Readers Book Club; an independent reading book club for third and fourth graders. 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# Director's Corner by Paul McCann



In addition to our "We the People" series of programs, the Library will be hosting a display of America's Founding Documents between January and the end of March and again in June and July. To celebrate the 250th Anniversary of America's founding, the Washtenaw County Historical Consortium created an exhibit that introduces the five seminal documents from our nation's history This traveling exhibit will introduce large scale replicas of the Declaration of Independence, the Federalist Papers, the Bill of Rights, the Northwest Ordinances and the U.S. Constitution, bringing these critical historical insights directly to residents across Washtenaw County.

The "American Founding Documents" exhibit was made possible by an America250MI History Grant awarded to the Salem Area Historical Society on behalf of the Consortium.



Thank you to the Dexter Area Historical Society for their financial contributions and to the faculty and students at Hillsdale College who researched and assembled this exhibit.

The Library would also like to thank our generous local resident (who wishes to remain anonymous) for lending a Christmas Village collection for display at the Library. Children and adults enjoy spying all the different people and places set up each year and the Library appreciates the time and effort of our volunteer.
